Section 2: Personal Statement & Study Plan Writing Guide

Part A: The Personal Statement - Telling Your Story

Your personal statement should be a compelling narrative, not just a list of accomplishments. Use this structure to guide your writing.

1. The Hook (1 Paragraph):

- Goal: Grab the reader's attention immediately.
- Ask Yourself: What is the single most powerful moment or experience that connected me to Korea? Start there. Don't say "I have been interested in Korea since..."

2. Your Journey (1-2 Paragraphs):

- Goal: Show, don't just tell, your growing interest.
- Ask Yourself: How did my initial interest evolve? Did I start learning the language? Did I join a club? How did it connect to my academic or personal life?

3. The Academic Connection (2 Paragraphs):

- Goal: Connect your passion to your chosen major. This is the most critical part.
- Ask Yourself: Why must I study this specific major in Korea? What unique academic
 opportunities does Korea offer? How have my past studies prepared me for this?
 Mention specific aspects of the Korean approach to your field.

4. Future Goals & Contribution (1 Paragraph):

- Goal: Explain your long-term vision.
- Ask Yourself: How will studying in Korea help me achieve my future career goals? How do
 I plan to contribute to the relationship between Korea and my home country?

5. Conclusion (1 Short Paragraph):

- Goal: End with a strong, confident statement.
- Ask Yourself: Why am I the ideal candidate for the GKS program? Summarize your core message.

Part B: The Study Plan - Your Academic Roadmap

This is a technical document, not a story. Be clear, organized, and specific.

1. Pre-Degree Language Study Plan (1-2 Paragraphs):

- Goal: Show you are serious about learning Korean.
- Content: How will you prepare for and excel during the one-year language program?
 Mention your current study methods (if any) and your goals (e.g., "My goal is to achieve TOPIK 4 within the year by...").

2. Detailed Plan of Study for Degree (Bulleted or Table Format is excellent):

- Goal: Prove you have thoroughly researched your program.
- Content: Go to your target university's website and look up the curriculum for your major. List specific courses you plan to take each semester. Mention any professors whose research interests you or labs you hope to join. This shows incredible initiative.

3. Post-Graduation Plan (1-2 Paragraphs):

- Goal: Connect your degree to your future.
- Content: Reiterate your career goals from the Personal Statement. Explain how the specific knowledge and experiences gained from your study plan in Korea will directly prepare you for this path. Be concrete.

Section 3: Sample Letter of Recommendation Request Email

Use this template when asking a professor or mentor to write a letter for you.

Subject: Recommendation Letter Request for [Your Name] - Global Korea Scholarship

Dear Professor [Professor's Last Name],

I hope this email finds you well.

I am writing to you today to respectfully request if you would be willing to write a strong letter of recommendation for my application to the Global Korea Scholarship (GKS) program. I am applying for the [MA/BA/PhD] program in [Your Major] at [List of 1-2 Top Choice Universities, e.g., Seoul National University].
