Your first mission is to master the Korean alphabet. It's easier than it looks! Use this chart to learn the characters and their sounds. Focus on learning the sound each letter makes, not its English name.

Pro Tip: Remember that Korean is written in syllable blocks. Each block contains at least one consonant and one vowel. For example: = (h) + + (a) + - (n) = = (han); - (g) + - (eu) + = (l) = = (geul).
